Commonwealth University	Applied Phonetics Pronunciation	FREN225-99	Tue/Thu	11:00-12:15		Synchronous	Analyzes French sound system. Drills on pronunciation and intonation. Selections of prose, poetry, and songs for imitation. Includes a study of the speech organs and how this knowledge helps to articulate and pronounce French language words with more precision and better sentence rhythm. Introduces students to and practice of the International Phonetic Alphabet for transcription of French speech.	5

It is designed to present the computer science student with further depth of knowledge in a continuation of CPSC 237, Data Structures. Study in advanced topics of data structures focusing on their structure, efficiency and application. Data structures introduced/expanded include graphs, sets and trees.	3
Kutztown University	ADVANCED NETWORKING	CPSC 411 010	Mon/Wed	4:30- 5:45		Multi-Modal	This course deals with the theory, implementation and administration of networks. It is also concerned with the various layers of Internet architecture stack, with concentration on layers 3 and 4. The primary protocols for these layers, Transmission Control Protocol (TCP) and Internet Protocol (IP), will be studied in detail. Network addressing and related protocols will also be covered.	3
Kutztown University	DATA MINING AND PREDICTIVE ANALYTICS I	CPSC 458 010	Tues/Thurs	4:30-5:45		Multi-Modal	Many academic and commercial endeavors apply the techniques of data mining and predictive analytics to their data sets. Students taking this course will learn methods and software tools for locating and obtaining data of interest, for preparing data for semi-automated analysis, for interacting with software tools in analyzing data for patterns, for visualizing structural and dynamic patterns in data, and for designing systems that respond to patterns in data. Data cleaning and formatting require some programming in a modern scripting language.	3
Kutztown University	FUNDAMENTALS: COMPUTER SYS	CPSC 505 501	Thursday	6:00-8:50		Multi-Modal	This course discusses the design and organization of modern computer systems, including fundamental hardware and software building blocks. The course provides a comprehensive introduction to computer organization and computer communications. Topics related to computer organization include Boolean logic, number systems, data representation and formats, hardware building block, processor architectures, memory and storage subsystems input/output systems, and operating system functions. Topics related to computer communications including synchronous and asynchronous data communication, and local and wide area networks.	3

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Kutztown University	ADV SCRIPTING DATA SCIENCE	CPSC 523 301	Thursday	6:00-8:50		Multi-Modal	This course covers advanced study and practice in using a modern scripting language to integrate off-the-shelf code libraries for the retrieval of unstructured and partially structured data, and for the cleaning, integration, formatting, storage, analysis, and visualization of large data sets. Modern scripting languages include powerful built-in features for storing, retrieving, mapping, and integrating data; code libraries extend such features greatly. Libraries include those for regular-expression based extraction of textual data, data integration, statistical analysis and correlation, machine learning, natural language processing, machine vision and listening, visualization, and storage in files and database systems. Emphasis is on using a scripting language to glue together off-the-shelf library modules without writing the complex, underlying library code.	3
Kutztown University	ADVANCED UNIX PROGRAMMING	CPSC 552 201	Monday	6:00-8:50		Multi-Modal	This course studies the concepts dealing with UNIX system programming. Emphasis will be placed on working with processes and interprocess communication (IPC). Details of IPC will be explored and implemented, including pipes, semaphores, sockets, and remote procedure calls.	3
Kutztown University	APPRO & METH IN POL SCI	POLI 509 801	TBA	TBA		Online 100 Percent	This course explores the nature and scope of political science, introduces the terminology of the discipline and describes the various approaches used in the sub-fields of the discipline, emphasis on quantitative analysis. It describes and analyzes the conflict between the normative and behavioral schools.	5
Kutztown University	LGBTQ STUDIES	SOCI 217 815	Tues/Thurs	1:30-2:45		Online 100 Percent	The purpose of the course is to introduce students to Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, transgender, and Queer (LGBTQ) Studies. It will trace the conceptual distinctions drawn between sex, gender, and sexuality, as well as the history of diverse genders and sexualities. It will also examine contemporary issues facing LGBTQ individuals and communities. Emphasis is placed on feminist and social constructionist approaches to studying LGBTQ issues.	5

Special emphasis will be placed on the contributions of Marx, Weber, Simmel, Pareto, and Durkheim.	5
Kutztown University	PROFESSIONAL CONTEXT	SOWK 200 810	Tues/Thurs	1:30-2:45		100 Percent Online w/Schd Ptrn	The course builds upon and reinforces the foundation of generalist social work knowledge, social work values, principles, ethics, attitudes, and skills introduced in the Introduction to Social Work Course. Students study the Code of Ethics of the National Association of Social Workers and practice ethical decision making. The course reinforces the skills necessary to implement the phases of the problem-solving approach to social work practice with multi-level client systems (individuals, groups, families, communities, organizations). Students will be required to participate in a 30-hour volunteer field/laboratory experience. Open only to Social Work majors and minors. A grade of "C" or better is required in this course to enter SOWK 250.	5
Kutztown University	FOUND HUM BEHAVR/SOC ENV	SOWK 400 801	Saturday	3:00-4:50		100 Percent Online w/Schd Ptrn	This course, for foundation-year graduate students in social work, teaches students to critically evaluate and apply biological, psychological, and social theories to client situations across the lifespan. Effects of the interplay of biological, psychological, social, economical and cultural elements of the social environment on human functioning are examined. Systems promoting or deterring people in the attainment and maintenance of optimal health and well-being are explored with particular attention on the effects over the life course of these systems on populations at risk, ethnic and racial minorities, sexual minorities, women, and persons with disability.	5
Kutztown University	CASE MGM:AN INTERDIS APPR	SOWK 320 810	Mon/Wed/Fri	12:00-12:50		100 Percent Online w/Schd Ptrn	The course will cover principles, theory, and the historical development of case management as an interdisciplinary method of delivering health and human services. Emphasis will be placed on the development of skill in implementing the phases of this method of practice (assessment, goal setting, case planning, monitoring progress, and termination and evaluation). Required: a grade of "C" or better for social work majors.	5

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Kutztown University	APP FAM POL/FAM SERV PROG	SOWK 555 802	Saturday	3:00-4:00		100 Percent Online w/Schd Ptrn	This course will explore the interrelation between family functioning and public/private policies at the local, state, and federal level. Students will explore how the families contribute to social problems, how families are affected by these problems, and how a family focus can enhance the effectiveness of policies. Students will assess the consequences policies may have for family well-being with special attention to selected family policy issues. The course will include theoretical approaches for conceptualizing family policy and, most importantly, the roles professionals can play in using research to design, implement, and evaluate policies and programs.	5

Kutztown University	INTERMEDIATE SPANISH III	SPAN 103 810	TBA	TBA		Online 100 Percent	Students who have successfully completed SPAN 101 and SPAN 102 or the equivalent (per the CAPE language placement test) continue the development of basic language skills (speaking, listening, reading and writing) and the exploration of Spanish-speaking cultures. Content is based on the "5C's" of second language acquisition: communication, cultures, connections, comparisons and communities. Course is taught in Spanish.	5
Kutztown University	INTERMEDIATE SPANISH IV	SPAN 104 811	Mon/Wed	2:00-2:50		Online 100 Percent	Students who have satisfactorily completed Elementary Spanish I and II, or equivalent, continue the development of the basic skills in aural comprehension, speaking, and writing. In addition, emphasis is placed on independent readings.	5
Kutztown University	SPANISH COMPOSITION	SPAN 212 810	TBA	TBA		Online 100 Percent	This course is designed to improve the student's writing skills in Spanish. Special attention will be devoted to learning some of the basic types of writing: descriptive, narrative, expository, persuasive and the research paper.	5

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Kutztown University	WRITTEN AND ORAL COMM FOR SHL	SPAN 214 810	TBA	TBA		Online 100 Percent	Written and Oral Communication for Spanish-speaking Heritage Learners (SHLs) is a course designed for those learners who are currently and linguistically connected to the Spanish-speaking community in PA and beyond. The aim of this course will be to offer enhanced/increased oral and written proficiency of Spanish as it explores the linguistic diversity of Latinos through activities aligned with the three modes of communication: interpretive (reading and listening); interpersonal (authentic oral and written interpersonal communication); and presentational (writing and speaking). This course will also serve to reconnect SHLs to cultural issues of their community. (In Spanish).	5
Kutztown University	Music for Exceptional Learners	MUED 335 801	TBA	TBA		Asynchronous	In this course students will become familiar with general educational issues and music education trends affecting exceptional learners in the United States. Developmental music experiences for the exceptional learner in mainstreamed music classes will be addressed with an emphasis on the identification, methods of instruction, and arranging of music for exceptional learners. Questions about music education teaching and learning will be covered, and students will be introduced to variations in language ability, assessment, inclusion, and music education in a diverse world. The class will develop a sense of community online through reading and posting to discussion forums and communicating regarding case study and video presentations.	5

Areas to be addressed include foundations of acoustics, physiology of the hearing system, musical preferences, human developmental psychology in relationship to musical learning, personality of musicians, performance anxiety, psychology of musical performance, relationships between music and intelligence, and the relationship between music, meaning and culture.	5

Every topic in each area is being discussed in the context of integrated flow of goods and services from suppliers to customers and continuous flow of information from the customers to the suppliers. Covers the issues facing managers of import-export firms, trading companies, international service companies, and multinational corporations.	5

Designed to deal with specific issues and trends in the field; develop an operational model for institutional design, implementation, and evaluation; establish an operational role concept for specific student affairs positions.	5
Shippensburg University	Subject Area Content Access for Students with Learning Disabilities in a Standards Aligned System	SPEE 551	Wednesday	6:30 - 9:15		Synchronous	Advanced course in the field of learning disabilities across the life span; from early childhood to adulthood. Will familiarize students with how to teach students with learning disabilities in reading, writing, spelling, math, social studies, science, and social skills by developing research based interventions supported by assessment data. Designed to help students become critical thinkers, creative and expert planners, and effective practitioners, and to work in a standards aligned system. Field experiences required.	0
Shippensburg University	The Role of Supervision in Promoting Student Achievement	EDLD 518-01	Monday	5:30 - 8:00		Synchronous	Designed for educational leaders, whether they are practicing administrators, subject-area supervisors, department chairpersons, cooperating teachers, or mentors. Principal thrust is to facilitate the formulation and implementation of a teacher evaluation and supervision system–based on data-driven and researched-based strategies and practical skills, and supported by law–that promotes enhanced student learning and quality teaching. Treats supervision and evaluation as two separate but complementary functions that should be integrated into a coherent system that provides differentiated opportunities for teacher growth and evidence-based quality assurance. Assists in developing the research-base, practical skills, and necessary dispositions to meet the needs of all teachers, regardless of their current career stage or level of performance.	5

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Shippensburg University	Instruction for Students with High Incidence Disabilities	SPEE 550-01	Tuesday	6:30 - 9:15		Synchronous	Provides a study of historical, empirical, and research findings, forces, and factors making up the fundamental structure of the field of learning disabilities. Topics include: causes of learning disorders, characteristics of individuals with learning deficits, models of learning dysfunctions, and perceptual-conceptual learning processes and cerebral components. Discussions will include the use of dietary, medical and physiological intervention techniques, administrative programming and parental concerns and responsibilities. New topics and new areas will be included as they are noted in the research literature. Methods of presentation will be basically lecture and discussion. Field experiences required.	0
Shippensburg University	The Role of Research and Data Informed Decision-Making for School Leaders	EDLD 515	Thursday	5:30 - 8:00		Synchronous	Designed to provide school administrators with the knowledge and skills necessary to be intelligent consumers and practitioners of research. Research designs, methods, and results are important tools for leadership and decision-making; administrators should be able to evaluate research studies and implement the findings. Requirements of federal legislation necessitates leadership that is, in part, derived from data-based decision making. Additionally, there may be situations in which an administrator is responsible for constructing a research proposal to qualify for a grant or to lead change in an educational program.	5
Shippensburg University	Legal and Ethical Issues that Impact on Student Learning	EDLD 521-1	Tuesday	5:30 - 8:00		Synchronous	Focuses on the legal foundations for the establishment and operation of public schools in the United States and Pennsylvania in particular. Assists students in understanding key issues that impact on student learning from both an historical and current perspective. Students should be knowledgeable in all important aspects of school law from basic rights of individuals to the legal requirements for designing and maintaining appropriate school environments for learning. In addition to a review of landmark cases and current issues, students will also study laws and topics specific to building level leadership in Pennsylvania.	5

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Shippensburg University	Public Budgeting and Financial Management	POLI 503-1			8-18-2025 to 10-10-2025	Asynchronous	Provides the knowledge base required to understand and interpret public sector budgets and the principles underlying public sector budgeting and decision making. Budget processes, influences, and tensions are explored as well as various budgeting approaches, formats, and historical developments. Emphasis is placed on developing analytical skills to interpret and design budgets and their processes and understanding the expanding role that budgets play in public sector management.	5
Shippensburg University	Foundations of Strategic Communication	COMM 505			8-25-2025 to 10-17-2025	Asynchronous	This course is designed to prepare current and future strategic communication professionals for the workforce in an increasingly digital and diverse world. The course will cover the theory and practice of strategic communication, including public relations definitions and models, persuasion, strategic planning, reputation management, and emerging technologies. The course also will include an exploration of major communication theories to help students understand the influence of strategic communication on individuals, organizations, and society.	5

Topics include strategic alignment of IT with organizational goals, organizational efficiency and transformation enabled by IT, organizational learning and innovation enabled by IT, positioning and managing of the IT function, IT and sustainability. This course also examines from business perspective systems and technologies that help companies innovate and deliver business value such as business analytics, cloud computing, enterprise resource planning, customer relationship management, and supply chain systems.	0

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Shippensburg University	Logistics & Transportation Management	SCMG 510-01			8-25-2025 to 10-17-2025	Asynchronous	The course introduces students to the theories, concepts, and practice of logistical operations needed to support the supply chain. It investigates the rise of logistics management from a minor business function to its current role as the backbone of the supply chain. Covers issues related to state of the art methods of delivering goods and services to customers through efficient inventory management, materials flow, transportation, warehousing, and procurement.	5
